Visual Guide / Social Story

The Dialysis Project, created by Leah Lewis, Robert Chafe and Evalyn Parry, is an up-close-and-personal encounter with one woman's lived experience of self-administered home dialysis.

Writer, performer, and kidney patient Leah Lewis invites audiences into her home for a unique "performance". Hooking herself up to her dialysis machine, Leah offers us a window into a lifemaintaining medical procedure, and simultaneously, into her own life, as she weaves an intimate story about isolation, relationships, mortality, resilience, and identity.

Leah's vivid, personal storytelling is supported by evocative and imaginative visuals, and the result is a fascinating, funny, touching and utterly unique show.



This video will be **unlisted**, so you will not be able to look it up on YouTube like a normal video. You will only be able to access the stream through the link you will be sent, but the stream will look like a regular YouTube video.



On the right is a sample stream to show you what *The Dialysis Project* stream will look like:








<u>**Closed Captions</u>** are available for the stream on YouTube.</u>

The closed caption button looks like two capital letter 'C' enclosed in a white box, showing here on the right.

You can find this box on the right-hand side of your YouTube screen. Once Closed Captions have been enabled, a red line will appear under the '**CC**' box to let you know it is working!

These captions are captured live, so there may be a slight delay in between when the performer speaks and when the text appears on your screen.

There are also additional settings for the captions available under the settings symbol, showing here next to the CC symbol. Once you click on the settings symbol, click 'Subtitles/CC.' Here you can find options for caption language, colour, background and size.


Performances of *The Dialysis Project* will contain a **Live Medical Procedure**.

In medicine, dialysis is the process of removing excess water, solutes, and toxins from the blood in people whose kidneys can no longer perform these functions naturally.

This procedure includes the insertion of a needle into the dialysis site. The performer Leah is a dialysis patient who completes at-home dialysis treatment, and this treatment is featured live as part of *The Dialysis Project*.


This procedure is safe, and one that Leah is familiar with having performed it on their own for years. There are measures in place for the performance to ensure the safety of the performer and production crew.

Viewer discretion is advised: the needle will be visible, there will be blood, medical equipment sounds, and medical jargon that may be triggering for some viewers.

Leah Lewis- Creator/Performer

Leah Lewis is an artist and scholar. She has worked as an actor and writer within the provincial arts industry for many years, with theatre, film and television credits that include Artistic Fraud's adaptation of Michael Crummey's work Salvage: The Story of a House, Pope Productions adaptation of Ed Riche's Rare Birds, and others. Leah merges her love of the arts with her research in her assistant professor position with Memorial University Faculty of Education's Counselling Psychology graduate program. In particular, Leah applies the arts to research that considers the patient role and input to health outcomes. The Dialysis Project is the second of a series of Leah's arts-based work on patient voice and health.





Robert Chafe – Creator/Dramaturge

Robert Chafe has worked in theatre, dance, opera, radio, fiction and film. His stage plays have been seen in Canada, the United Kingdom, Australia and in the United States, and include *Oil and Water, Tempting Providence, Afterimage, Under Wraps, Between Breaths,* and *The Colony of Unrequited Dreams* (adapted from the novel by Wayne Johnston.) He has been shortlisted twice for the Governor General's Literary Award for Drama and he won the award for *Afterimage* in 2010. He has been guest instructor at Memorial University of Newfoundland, Sir Wilfred Grenfell College, and The National Theatre School of Canada. In 2018 he was awarded an honorary doctorate from Memorial University of Newfoundland. He is the playwright and Artistic Director of Artistic Fraud of Newfoundland.

Evalyn Parry – Creator/Director

Evalyn Parry is an award-winning, multi-disciplinary theatremaker: a director, writer, performer and collaborator committed to performance that creates a space for challenging conversations, personal and social transformation. From 2015 to 2020, she served as Artistic Director of Buddies in Bad Times Theatre in Toronto. Parry's acclaimed, genre-defying works have toured nationally and internationally, including Kiinalik: These Sharp Tools (Edinburgh International Festival; Cervantino Festival, Mexico; Luminato Festival) and SPIN, a musical exploration of the feminist history of the bicycle (Lincoln Center, NYC; Sound Symposium, Newfoundland; High Performance Rodeo, Calgary, and many more). Other recent productions include *Obaaberima* by Tawiah M'Carthy (Buddies; Dora Award for Outstanding Production), Gertrude and Alice (Buddies / Independent Aunties; Governor General's Literary Award nominee) and the acclaimed, queer inter-generational Youth/ Elders Project (Buddies). In addition to numerous Dora Mavor Moore Awards, Evalyn is the recipient of the KM Hunter Award for Theatre and the Ken McDougall Award for Directing, and has released five albums of music. www.evalynparry.com



The **Set Design** is made up of physical elements that establish the world of the play / show. These elements may include furniture, walls, stairs, doors, etc.

The set for *The Dialysis Project* is a less traditional set than we usually see in a theatre setting, and this is an unusual show! It is exciting to see artists creating new ways to present their work around the boundaries that have come with COVID-19 restrictions.

The Set for *The Dialysis Project* is the home of performer Leah Lewis. This story is one of isolation and belonging - one that will resonate with us all as we reflect on the past year of isolation from each other.

A major set piece of this show is Leah's at-home dialysis machine which will be featuring prominently during the show. We will also see furniture, artwork, and lights that make up Leah's home. We will also see several **Props** such as medical supplies, food, and two puppet characters.

The **Sound** for *The Dialysis Project* includes ques and medical equipment sounds to accompany the storytelling.

All sound levels have been set to balance out the sound of Leah's dialyzing with the spoken text, so you can experience the medical procedure sounds without the words being drowned out.

Using the pulsing "whoosh" of Leah's dialysis site the "bruit" we hear through her stethoscope is a launching pad for warm, soothing, and fluid musical score with a taste of environmental sounds from Leah's home province Newfoundland & Labrador, and the pounding surf that is iconically connected to that place.


While on Dialysis, Leah takes in the world outside her living room window. The **Lighting Design** is inspired by that using the cool evening light from St. John's in late spring combined with the warm incandescent glow of her cozy home. Bold coloured light transports us to a Party in Montreal, and an apartment in the early hours of the morning. As the show progresses, the natural evening light from the window fades to evening shadow.

There are also overlapping animations that accompany Leah's story as she takes the audience on her journey.

Here is what Designer Elysha Poirier has to say about their design for *The Dialysis Project:*

"The video's goal is to elicit feelings of dreaming, embodiment, and memory. Hand drawn and painterly motifs are combined in playful animations that are closely related to

Leah's home in St. Johns, Newfoundland. Beautiful Signal Hill views, beloved canine companions, and the sharing of vivid dreams inspired the animated content you will see.

There are also videos and archival footage that help us place ourselves in a specific time or state of memory, as well as metaphors for the body's intricate and rhythmic systems."


