





No Pity (Liz Pickard, Rick Mercer, Ashley Billard) Operating out of the historic Longshoremen's Protective Union (LSPU) Hall, the building was acquired by Resource Foundation for the Arts (RFA) in 1976, who in turn created an artist-run cultural community centre in 1979 open to public membership. It was then that Resource Centre for the Arts (RCA) was born.

Newfoundlanders and Labradorians are natural-born storytellers, entertainers, and artists. 



Today, there is a wealth of new material that deserves to be staged. As the only venue for independent multidisciplinary productions, RCA offers a variety of rental arrangements that ensure that the venue is affordable for both emerging and seasoned artists to present their work. This is at the core of our mission. Investing in live theatre ensures that our stories continue to be told.

As a heritage structure in the centre of the city, with a history that dates back to the 1700s, it goes without saying that maintaining the facility requires continuous investment. RCA will upgrade its stage and undertake renovations to make the facility accessible for individuals with physical challenges. Advances in lighting technology to bring greater energy efficiency are also required in order to achieve reduced operational costs and lessen environmental impact.

Training the next generation of technical and creative support staff is also central to the RCA mission. Qualified experienced personnel from all aspects of thetre production are in scarce supply as formal training of theatre professionals in Newfoundland and Labrador is lacking. We need to develop a skilled theatrical workforce that will provide the capability to ensure that live theatrical works can continue to be presented to appreciative and engaged audiences. Real skill development comes from apprenticeships alongside highly skilled theatre professionals, with appropriate compensation for all. As the oldest year-round performance venue and theatre company, RCA is uniquely positioned to deliver on this need.
